AA/AS and BA/BS in Social Science - Cultural Anthropology Concentration Degree Planning Worksheet

The Associate's Degree programs in Social Science with a concentration in Cultural Anthropology must meet the first three foundations. Bachelor's Degree programs in Social Science with a concentration in Cultural Anthropology must meet all 6 foundations listed below. Knowledge of each area can be demonstrated through transcript credit, individual prior learning assessment (iPLA), prior learning evaluation (PLE), or credit by examination, or specific courses at SUNY Empire State University.

The goal of this worksheet is to provide a list of some of the SUNY Empire courses that fulfill each Foundation area for degree in Social Science with a concentration in Cultural Anthropology. It is suggested that one course not be used to fulfill more than one Foundation (with the exception of Foundation #6). Students should explain how they meet each Foundation in their Degree Program Rationale.
