



RN to BSN Admission Requirements

This upper-division nursing program includes online courses and two community-based precepted clinical experiences. Most students enroll on a part-time basis and complete the program in about 24-36 months.

Admission requirements include:

- » An admissions application and essay
- » An active, unencumbered New York state RN license, and
- » An associate degree or diploma from a New York state approved nursing program or equivalent.

RN to BSN Curriculum

Nursing Component 41 credits
General Learning Component 83 credits

The RN to BSN program requires a total of 124 credits completed through a combination of nursing component requirements, transfer credits and credits earned by meeting SUNY Empire State College general learning requirements.

Core – 37 credits

Clinical practice experience requirements are embedded in the Community Health Nursing and Baccalaureate Nursing Capstone courses. The clinical experiences are designed to meet both pre-determined and personal learning objectives. Students design their clinical and capstone experiences in collaboration with a faculty member and a local preceptor, with the learning objectives in mind.

Elective Requirement – 4 credits

More than 50 online courses have been approved by the nursing faculty to meet the elective requirement. In addition, selected professional certifications also have been approved to meet the elective requirement. The School of Nursing and Allied Health catalog and website include some examples of approved courses and certifications to meet the elective requirement. Some examples are:

General Learning Component – 83 credits

The remaining 83 credits are obtained via the transfer of credits and by completing SUNY Empire State College general learning requirements.

Master of Science in Nursing Education and Master of Science in Nursing Administration Admission Requirements

Admission requirements include:

- » An admissions application and essay,
- » An active, unencumbered New York state RN license,
- » A bachelor's degree in nursing with a GPA of 3.0 or higher, and
- » A resumé that clearly demonstrates at least one year of clinical practice as a registered nurse.

Master of Science in Nursing Education Curriculum

The M.S. in Nursing Education program requires a total of 42 credits, including six core courses, three graduate-level courses, four courses within the nursing education specialty, and one graduate elective course.

The M.S. in Nursing Administration program requires a total of 33 credits, including six core courses, four courses within the nursing administration specialty, and one graduate-level elective course.

Graduate-level Elective Requirement – 3 credits

Please note: Graduate-level courses to be considered for transfer must be completed within seven years of admission. A maximum of 9 graduate-level credits are accepted in transfer.

Application Deadlines

The School of Nursing and Allied Health accepts applications for the Fall and Spring terms only. Our programs have limited capacity, so we encourage you to apply early. If we are unable to accommodate your first-choice term, we will give your application preference for the next available term. All application materials must be submitted by the deadlines listed below.

- » **June 15** for the Fall term
- » **Nov. 1** for the Spring term

Bachelor of Science in Allied Health Admission Requirements

Admission requirements include:

- » An admissions application and essay
- » An associate degree or diploma in allied health or a related field from an accredited higher-education institution
- » A current license or certification (for professions requiring licensure or certification)
- » Completed of a minimum of 12 credits in the natural and social sciences (Anatomy and Physiology I and II are required).

Bachelor of Science in Allied Health Curriculum

The Bachelor of Science in Allied Health for allied health professionals includes eight online core courses in addition to elective and general learning coursework. You can complete your general learning requirements online or on-site at any regionally accredited institution.

Elective Requirement – 16 credits

Choose from more than 100 online elective courses based on your interests and career goals.

General Learning Component – 76 credits

Earn general learning credits through transfer credit and/or by completing our general learning requirements online or at any regionally accredited institution.



You can earn credit for prior college-level learning and apply it toward your bachelor's degree. Your mentor will help you determine what relevant college-level learning you already have.

PLUS, the college accepts credits from accredited institutions if those credits are appropriate for your degree program at Empire State College.
